Continued onto a stile onto the open Moor and followed a path alongside broken wall to a track. Turned left back to the top of Well Lane. Had a look at the surrounding walled fields before descending down the lane back to Brinscall after a lovely but cool windy evening.

Turned right at the road and walked to the entrance to Lead Mine Clough.

A party of tits and warblers flew through the trees by the side of the road. Some were juveniles. Some of the group walked up onto Parsons Bullough while 9 of the party walked the lesser easier route into the the valley walking as far as a footbridge to wait for the other group to descend to the valley. While we waited could hear a strange sound coming from a hedge high up on the right.

Eventually a Green Woodpecker flew down the valley then eventually a juvenile Green Woodpecker flew over our heads and into a tree. A great sight of this scruffy bird with little or no tail feathers. We all retraced our steps back the same way.

The low sun came out giving us a beautiful sunset. A fitting end to the Summer Solstice the longest day with Winter Hill bathed in light.

Spotted a small area on the left which was waterlogged. There was at least 4 Lapwing here one of which had 2 juveniles. Also a strange pale Wagtail here.

Turned right down Pinfold Lane to view the 3 screens overlooking a pool and scrape.

The middle screen was the most productive with a few birds seen and a young stag Roe Deer.

Continued along the lane then turned right at the junction.

A Song Thrush was giving us a beautiful loud chorus.

Just after Burys Farm there was an overgrown area with an old stile in a corner with fields of growing crops beyond. I had a bad feeling about it not knowing what we would encounter so we retraced our steps back to the cars.

The best bird of the evening was on the return on Pinfold Lane where a Lesser Whitethroat was suddenly heard in the hedge. It was typically sculking in the dense hedgerow but when it flew it could seen but they were not good views.

The forecasted thunder storm didn't materialise.

This was a lovely warm walk and most of the group had a well deserved drink in The White Bull.
